Biography Early life and education. Bardaisan (Syriac: ܒܪܕܝܫܢ bar Daiṣān "son of the Daiṣān") was a Syriac author born on 11 July 154, in Edessa, Osroene, which, in those days, was alternately under the influence of both the Roman Empire and the Parthian Empire. To indicate the city of his birth, his parents called him "Son of the Daisan", the river on which Edessa was situated.

In passing over to the new faith, Bardaisan could not shake off the ancient glamour of the stars, or abjure the Semitic love of clothing thoughts in mythological forms. Scarcely anything survives of his writings, for a Dialogue concerning Fate, extant in Syriac under the title "Book of the Laws of the Countries," is by his disciple Philip.

Eusebius records in his Ecclesiastical History that Bardaisan's disciples translated pb. 89 his dialogues from Syriac into Greek, 21 and we may assume that the Book of the Laws was among these treatises so that the dialogue would have been available to Greek readers from a very early time.
